Baseball BC High-Performance Program 2024 Pathway Document

Introduction

The purpose of this document is to provide athletes, parents & guardians, and associations with a comprehensive summary of the Baseball BC high-performance program for the 2024 season. This includes explaining the high-performance pathways for each age division, event dates, selection processes, and camp locations.

Program Goals & Objectives

The goals and objectives of the Baseball BC high-performance program are:

- To create a fair and transparent process for selecting athletes to provincial teams.
- To provide athletes with high-level coaching at provincial camps and on provincial teams.
- To provide each provincial team athlete with a fun and rewarding tournament experience.
- To win a gold medal at the Baseball Canada Cup and 16U female Nationals.

Definitions

Zone ID Camp – A 14U/15U identification camp for male athletes.

Regional ID Camp – A 16U/17U identification camp for male athletes.

Aces ID Camp – A 14U to 21U identification camp for female athletes

21U Tryout Weekend – A 17U to 21U tryout to select female Team BC 21U.

Prospects Camp – The 14U/15U male provincial camp

Select Camp – The 16U/17U male provincial camp

Aces Provincial Camp – The 14U to **16U** female provincial camp.

Age Divisions

The following table shows the birth and traditional grad year associated with each age division.

<u>Division</u>	<u>Birth Year</u>	<u>Traditional Grad Year</u>
21U Female	2003, 2004, 2005, 2006, 2007	2021, 2022, 2023, 2024, 2025
16U Female	2008, 2009	2026, 2027
14U Female	2010 (or later)	2028 (or later)

A 14U female athlete is eligible for selection to the 16U female provincial team. Should this occur, the athlete could play on both provincial teams.

Any athlete born in 2010 or later is eligible for selection to the 14U female provincial team.

<u>Division</u>	<u>Birth Year</u>	<u>Traditional Grad Year</u>
17U Male	2007 (or later)	2025 (or later)
16U Male	2008	2026
15U Male	2009	2027
14U Male	2010	2028

An athlete born in 2007 or later is eligible for selection to the 17U male provincial team. Should this occur, the athlete could play on two provincial teams.

Athletes will play in their own age division on the male 14U, 15U, and 16U provincial teams. Athletes born in 2011 or later are not eligible for the 14U male provincial team.

Athletes of any gender can play in male divisions and may have an extra year of eligibility.

Minimum Playing Time

The following minimum playing time standards shall apply to all athletes.

<u>Male Events</u>	<u>Minimum Playing Time</u>
Summer Games & Canada Cup	Pitchers – One outing Position players – One start.
Other Tournaments	Pitchers – One outing Position players – 25% of the defensive innings

<u>Female Events</u>	<u>Minimum Playing Time</u>
National Championships Western Canada Championships	Pitchers – One outing. Position players – One Start

An athlete who is both a pitcher and a position player, need only receive the minimum playing time requirements in one of those capacities, not both.

An outing is defined as 40 pitches.

Unfortunately, a pitcher scheduled to start a medal round game may not get an opportunity to pitch if the team does not qualify. This would not constitute a violation of this rule.

A position player start is defined as starting the game in a defensive position and being substituted no earlier than the 6th inning.

Players who are injured or disciplined may not receive their minimum playing time.

Required Events on the High-Performance Pathway

Zone (14U/15U male), Regional (16U/17U male), and Aces (14U-21U female) Identification Camps are an athlete's entry point into high-performance programming. Unless exempted, as set out below, attendance at these camps is mandatory and athletes cannot receive an invitation to the provincial camp if they do not attend.

Provincial camps are also mandatory events for athletes interested in being selected to Team BC. Unless exempted, as set out below, athletes who do not attend these events in their entirety, are not eligible for provincial team selection.

Athletes who played on the 2023 Baseball BC 15U or 16U male provincial teams are not required to attend the Regional Identification Camp and will receive an automatic invitation to the 2024 Select Camp.

Athletes who played on the 2023 Baseball BC 21U female provincial team are not required to attend an Aces ID Camp and will receive an automatic invitation to the 21U tryout weekend.

Camp Exemptions

An athlete who is injured or has another special circumstance may receive an exemption from attending all or part of a required camp.

Athletes currently participating in a Baseball Canada national team program are eligible to receive camp exemptions.

Examples of special circumstances may include, but are not limited to, bereavement, school exams, and previously scheduled/committed college events. Special circumstances do not include, without limitation, scheduling conflicts with other sports, family holidays, and social engagements.

When an athlete is exempted, their evaluation will be based on feedback from coaches and past performance within the high-performance program. Being exempted allows the athlete to progress to the next stage in the high-performance program, but such progression is not guaranteed.

Exemptions for the 21U female tryout weekend are at the discretion of the Head Coach.

Requests for camp exemptions, outside of emergencies during a camp, must be made prior to the beginning of the camp, by email to the Director of High-Performance & Special Projects Kyle Williams (kyle@baseball.bc.ca). Requests cannot be approved by coaches. A doctor's note or other supporting documentation may be required.

Male Pathway (14U & 15U)

Step One – Zone Identification Camp

What is a Zone Identification Camp?

Zone identification camps are three-hour events that are the entry-point to the high-performance program.

Athletes are evaluated on specific skills, using a five-point rubric. A complete summary of the evaluation metrics will be provided to registered athletes in advance of the camp. Athletes will be sent a report card with their scores following the camp. These evaluations, combined with knowledge about past performance within the high-performance program, club team performance, and coach references, will be used to select athletes for the Summer Games teams and Prospects Camp.

Registration Process

Athletes must attend one camp **within their zone**, based on where they reside.

Step Two – BC Summer Games

The BC Summer Games is a multi-sport event held every two years, organized by the BC Summer Games Society. The province is split into eight zones and each zone (except for Zone 7) fields a team. Zone 5 will field two teams (A & B). Athletes are required to stay in accommodations provided by the BC Games during the event.

The BC Summer Games will be used to select athletes for the Prospects Camp. While it is not a required event on the high-performance pathway, participation is strongly recommended.

Each zone will field a roster of 16 athletes. The rosters will be announced on May 31st.

The BC Summer Games is held July 18-21 in Maple Ridge. Athletes will travel on July 17. Local athletes will report around 7pm on July 17.

The cost to attend the BC Summer Games is \$300.

Step Three – Prospects Camp

The Prospects Camp is an intensive three-day event used to select athletes for Team BC 14U and 15U. The camp combines both instruction from experienced coaches and athlete evaluation. New for 2024 – athletes will receive an extensive data-based report at the conclusion of the camp valued at over \$200.

Thirty-five athletes in each age category will be invited to the Prospects Camp. Invites will be announced on July 24th.

The Prospects Camp will be held August 9-11 in Chilliwack.

The cost to attend the Prospects Camp is \$420.

Step Four – Play on Team BC 14U or 15U

At the conclusion of the Prospects Camp, Baseball BC will name a roster of 16 athletes to Team BC 14U and Team BC 15U. Rosters will be announced August 12th.

Team BC 14U will compete in a Western Prospects tournament on Labour Day weekend in Alberta.

Team BC 15U will compete in the Desert Fall Classic, in Las Vegas, in October of 2024.

Athletes on Team BC 14U and 15U will be assessed a per player fee to cover coaching honorariums/expenses, tournament entry fees, and apparel. Athletes will make their own travel arrangements. Athletes will stay in accommodations with their families, the cost of which is not covered by Baseball BC. A block booking at a team hotel will be offered. Arrangements can be made for athletes to attend without a parent/guardian, under the supervision of coaches. The per player fee for 14U is \$300. The per player fee for 15U is \$450.

Step One – Regional Identification Camp

What is a Regional Identification Camp?

Regional identification camps are three-hour events that are the entry-point to the high-performance program.

Athletes are evaluated on specific skills, using a five-point rubric. A complete summary of the evaluation metrics will be provided to registered athletes in advance of the camp. Athletes will be sent a report card with their scores following the camp. These evaluations, combined with knowledge about past performance within the high-performance program, club team performance, and coach references, will be used to select athletes for the Select Camp.

Registration Process

Athletes may attend any Regional Identification Camp. Residence does not matter.

Exemptions

Athletes who played on Team BC 15U, or Team BC 16U during the 2023 season are exempted from attending a Regional Identification Camp and will receive an automatic invitation to the 2024 Select Camp.

Athletes who were named as alternates to Team BC 16U, **and** who attend the invitation only select team minicamp in May, are exempted from attending a Regional Identification Camp.

Step Two – Attend the Selects Camp

The Select Camp is an intensive three-day event used to select athletes for Team BC 16U and 17U. The camp combines both instruction from experienced coaches and athlete evaluation.

New for 2024 – athletes will receive an extensive data-based report at the conclusion of the camp valued at over \$200.

Thirty-five athletes in each age category will be invited to the Select Camp. Invites will be announced on June 4th. The Select Camp will be held July 2-4 at South Surrey Athletic Park. The cost to attend the Select Camp is \$420.

Step Three – Play on Team BC 16U or 17U

At the conclusion of the Select Camp, Baseball BC will name a roster of 20 players to Team BC 16U and Team BC 17U. Rosters will be announced on July 5th.

Team BC 16U will compete in a Western Prospects tournament on Labour Day weekend in Alberta.

Team BC 17U will compete in the Canada Cup, August 7-11 in Fort McMurray, Alberta.

Athletes on Team BC 16U will be assessed a per player fee of \$300 to cover coaching honorariums/expenses, tournament entry fees, and apparel. Athletes will make their own travel arrangements. Athletes will stay in accommodations with their families, the cost of which is not covered by Baseball BC. A block booking at a team hotel will be offered. Arrangements can be made for athletes to attend without a parent/guardian, under the supervision of coaches.

Athletes on Team BC 17U will be assessed a per player fee of \$575, plus the flight/bus cost of \$700, to cover coaching honorariums/expenses, accommodations, and apparel. Local transportation, flights, and accommodation will be provided.

Step Two A – Attend the Aces Provincial Camp (14U & 16U)

The Aces Provincial Camp is an intensive four-day event used to select athletes to Team BC 14U and 16U, and 21U. The camp combines both instruction from experienced coaches and athlete evaluation. New for 2024 – athletes will receive an extensive data-based report at the conclusion of the camp valued at over \$200.

Up to 70 athletes will be invited to the camp. Invites will be announced on June 4th.

The Aces Provincial Camp will be held July 8-11 at Whalley Stadium in Surrey.

The cost to attend the Aces Provincial Camp is \$470.

Step Two B – Attend the Tryout Weekend (21U)

The Aces tryout weekend is an evaluation to select athletes to Team BC 21U. The camp combines both instruction from experienced coaches and athlete evaluation and will take the form of standard team practice. The cost to attend is \$50. The tryout camp will be held July 6-7. July 6. 10:00-2:00 @ Whalley Stadium. July 7. 10:00-2:00 at South Surrey.

Step Three – Play on the Provincial Team

At the conclusion of the Aces Provincial Camp, Baseball BC will name the roster to Team BC 14U, Team BC 16U, and Team BC 21U.

The roster size for each team will be between 14 and 18 athletes depending on the depth of the talent pool in each age category. Rosters will be announced on July 12th.

Team BC 14U will compete in the Western Canada Championships, August 16-18 in **Spruce Grove, Alberta.**

Team BC 16U will compete in the National Championships, August 22-25 in Saskatoon, Sask.

Team BC 21U will compete in the National Championships, August 8-11 in Summerside, PEI.

Athletes on Team BC 14U will be assessed a per player fee of \$300 **plus the cost of the flight** to cover coaching honorariums/expenses, tournament entry fees, and apparel. **Athletes will make their own travel arrangements.** Athletes will stay in accommodations with their families, the cost of which is not covered by Baseball BC. A block booking at a team hotel will be offered. Athletes attending without a parent/guardian, under the supervision of coaches, will stay in team accommodation, for an additional cost.

Athletes on Team BC 16U ~~& 21U~~ will be assessed a per player fee of \$575, **plus \$520**, the cost of the flight to cover coaching honorariums/expenses, accommodations, and apparel. **Flights, local transportation, and accommodations are provided.**

Athletes on Team BC 21U will be assessed a per player fee of \$575, **plus \$1050**, the cost of their flight to cover coaching honorarium/expense, accommodations, local transportation, and apparel.
